Administration

Our administration somewhat reminds me of what some adults say children should be – seen and not heard. You may wonder why I say this. Yes, I have seen Mr. Peura, Mrs. Moger, and Mrs. Newcomb wandering the halls and conversing with the student body. But, you will rarely hear them talk about their jobs. So, for this piece, I interviewed the three people who make up our administration and asked them five questions.

The first question I asked was the following: What is your job title and what does it mean? Mrs. Moger is our superintendent, who oversees all aspects of education. Mr. Peura is the principal for grades 7-12, and he is also the athletic director, district test coordinator, and financial aid advisor. He is responsible for basically everything concerning grades 7-12. Mrs. Newcomb is the elementary coordinator, Title I director, and technology coordinator. She is responsible for grades 1-6 and the sophisticated network of computers we have.

Next, I asked how does a typical day go for each of them. All three of them invariably suggested that they did not have a typical day. Even though they all have duties to be performed, they have little clue as to what will happen that day.

I also asked how their jobs have an impact on events within our school? The high school principal schedules all our activities, lyceums, and programs. Transportation is also run through his office, and he controls facility use through the master calendar. The elementary coordinator okays or presents elementary events. Everything they do is okayed by the superintendent.

Another question I asked was which aspect of their jobs is most interesting? I once again got similar answers, but all three concurred that they enjoyed interacting with the students. Mrs. Moger said she loves young people; Mr. Peura said students are so varied, diverse, and full of life; and Mrs. Newcomb likes seeing growth in children.

The last question I asked was whether they enjoyed their jobs here. The answers I got were quite obvious. All three of them affirmed, but each had their own reason. Our athletic director said every day is an adventure, and the superintendent added the Climax school district is the best she's ever worked in, and the technology coordinator stated this is a great community, staff, and school with which to work.

Our administration has quite an effect on the events within our school, and without their expertise, who knows how disorganized events would be around here? Also, they care about the students and are very competent at what they do. Last, as I found while interviewing them, they are also patient. Thanks to them for answering the questions candidly.


