

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





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




Grooving With the Rhythms of Climax High School











About six years ago, a drug education program, "Just Say No", was introduced at Climax. High school athletes were asked to let younger kids know that saying "no" was cool, and pamphlets and videos urged the students to, "just say no". Climax sport player trading cards were part of this program. In 1990, a new program was adopted, and D.A.R.E. was launched. D.A.R.E. stands for Drug Awareness Resistance Education. This is a ten week program, where students are put into small groups and presented with a situation, usually pertaining to drugs or peer pressure. They are asked to come up with a solution and roll play for this class. This program is effective because it deals with everyday issues of drugs and alcohol, along with issues of school and peer pressures. This program has not yet taken off in our school, but is being considered for future use. These programs all operate on the principle that "prevention is the key" to drug and alcohol problems.













ACCUMULATE









