Knights Win Sub-Section 31 Championship

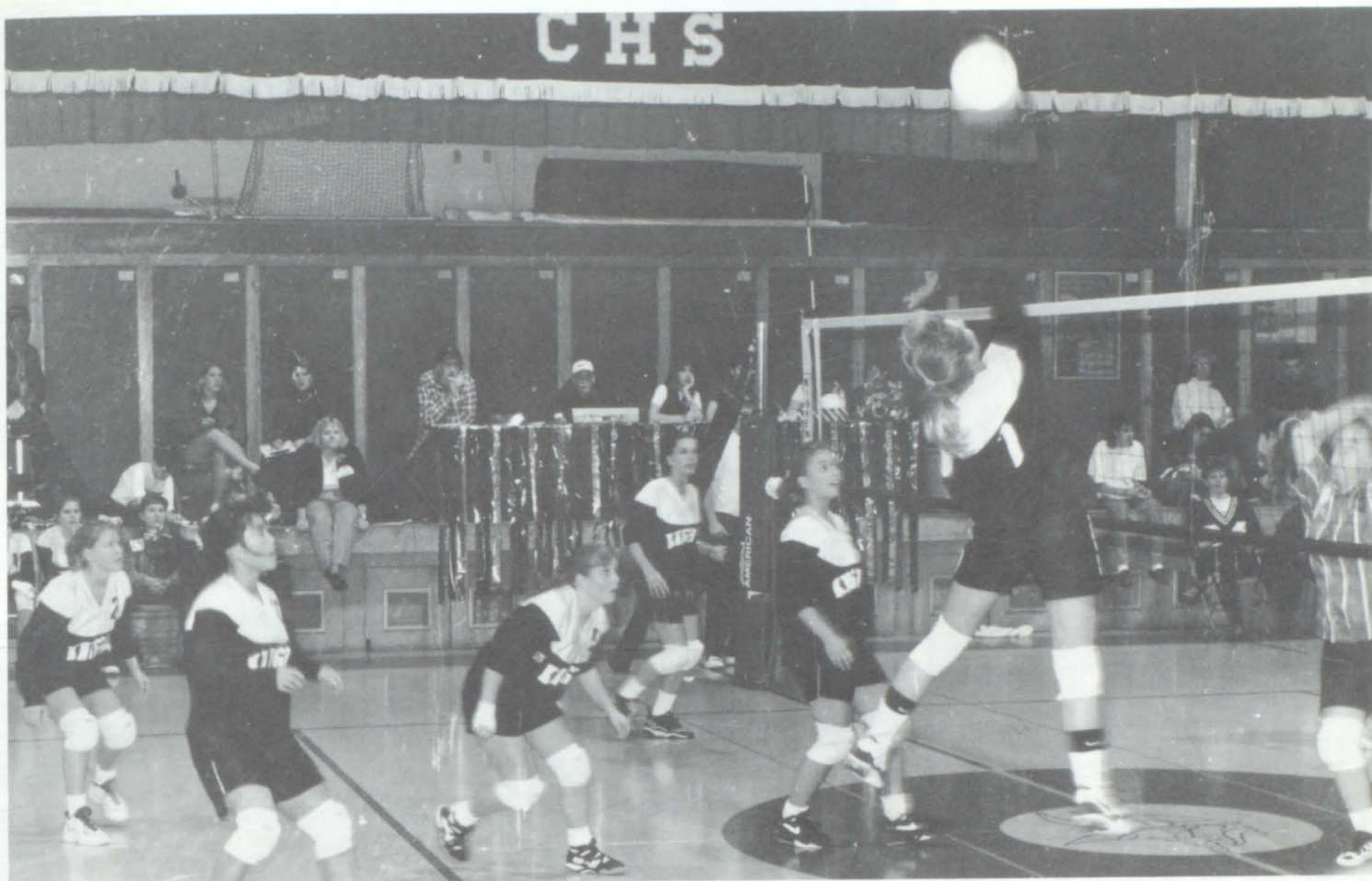

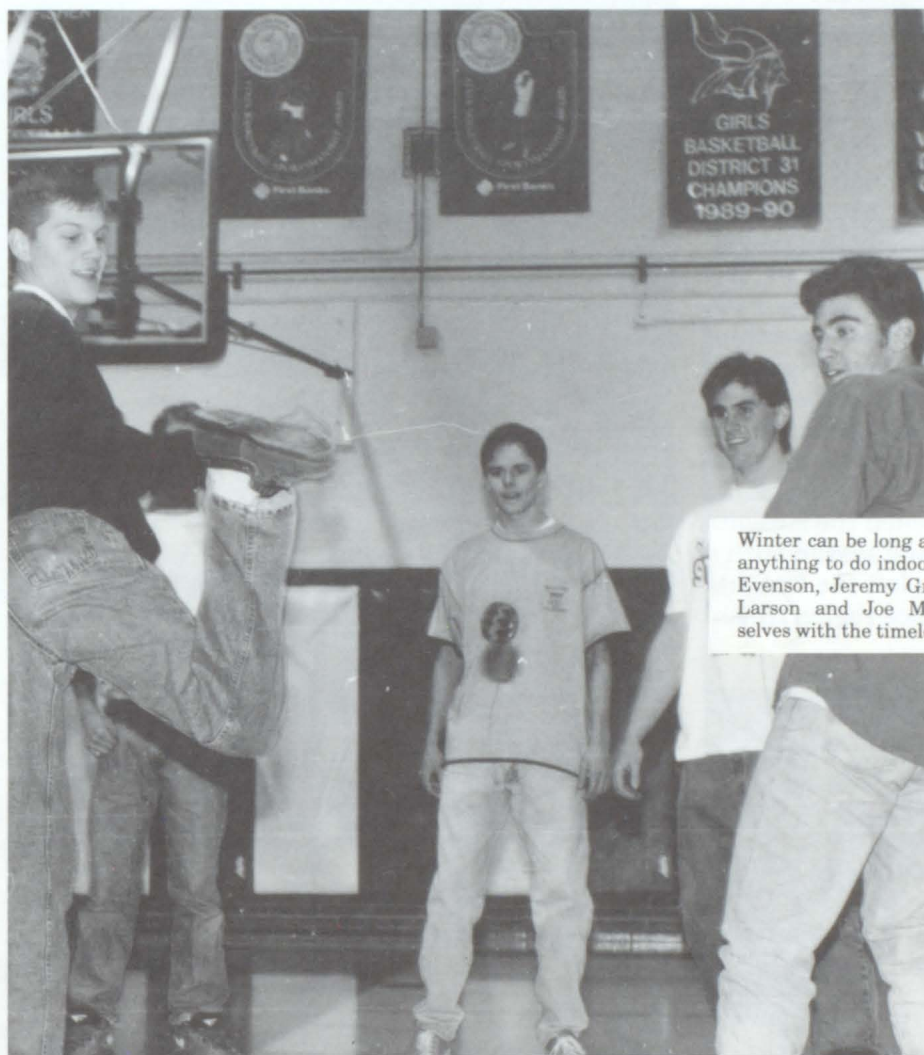

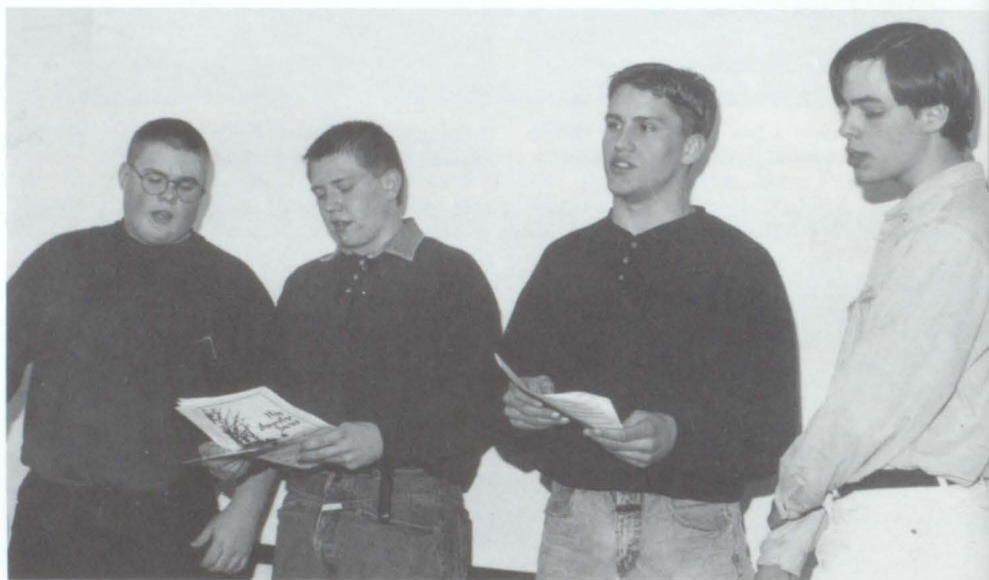
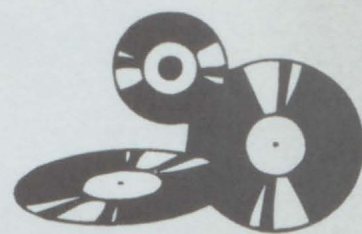
Always Busily Singing

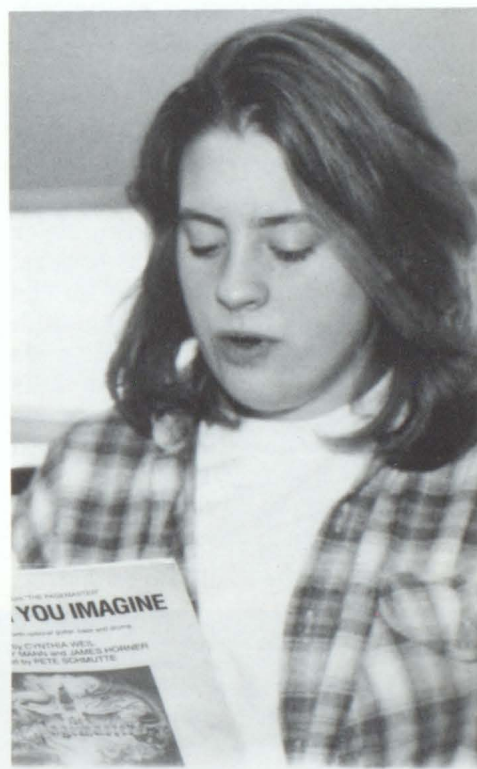

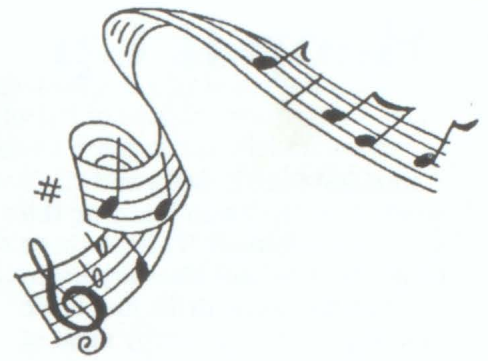

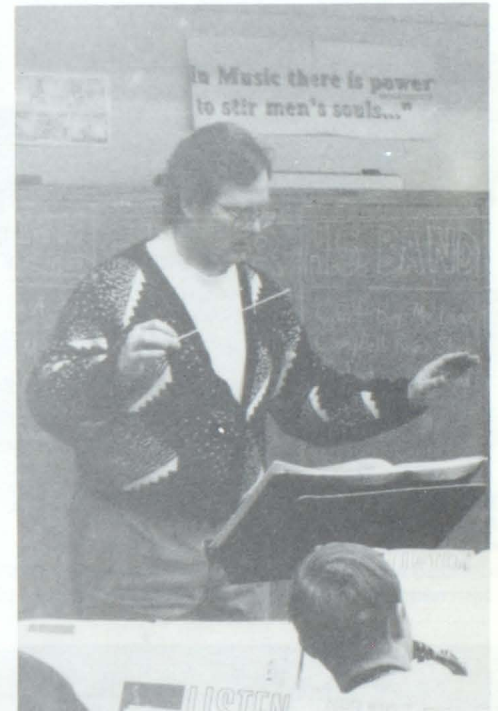

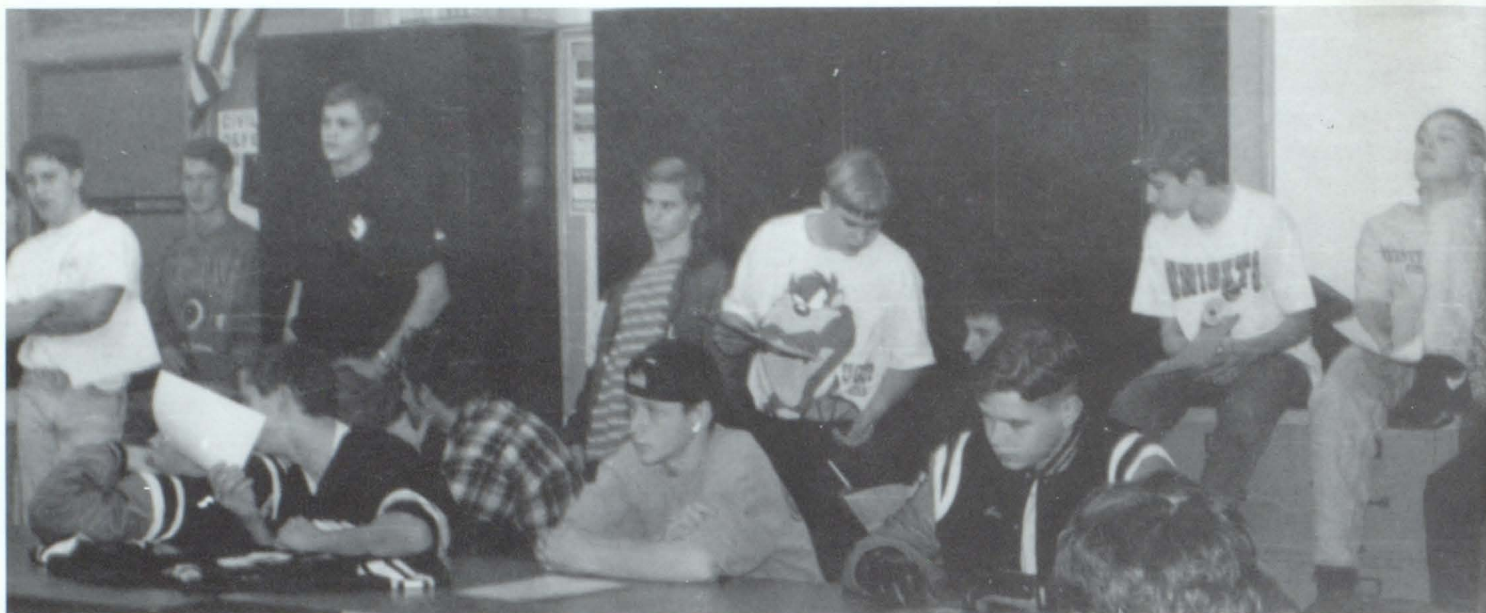

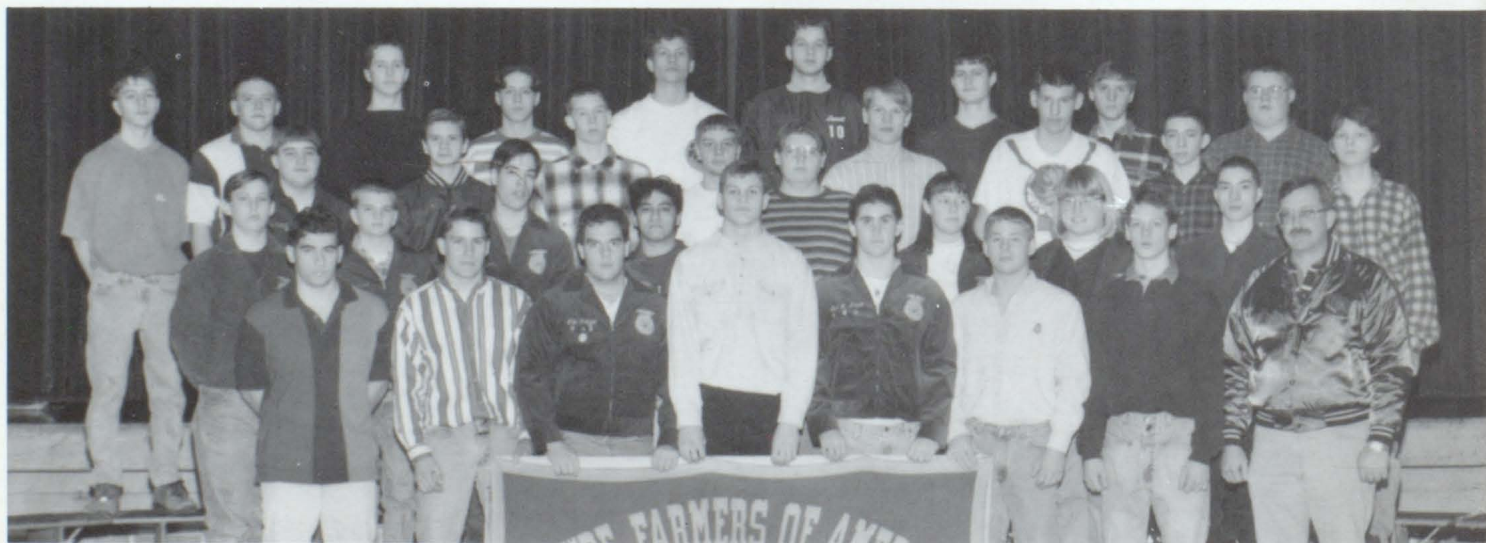

Does Track Mean Spring?

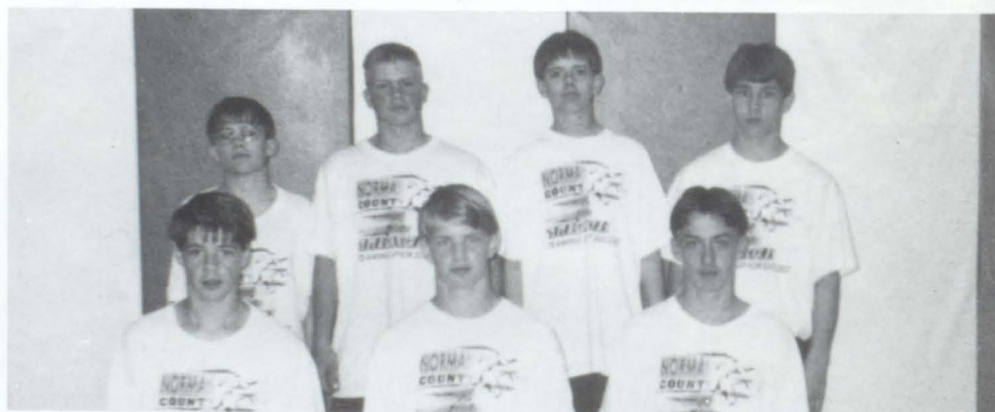

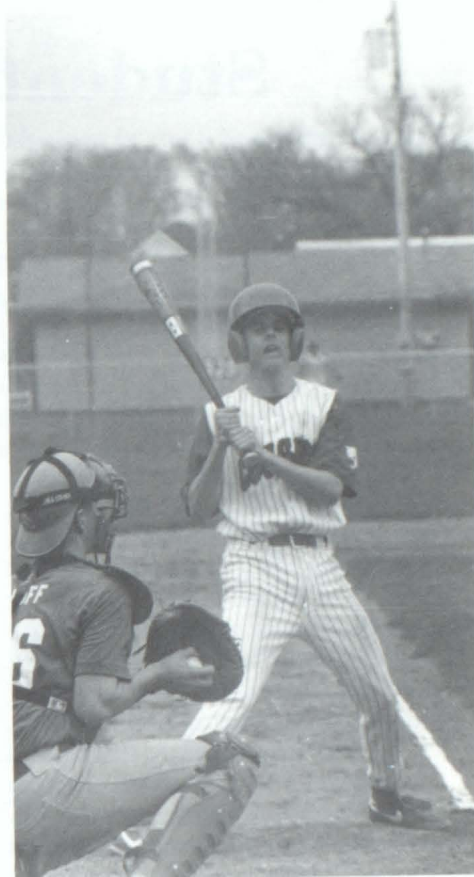

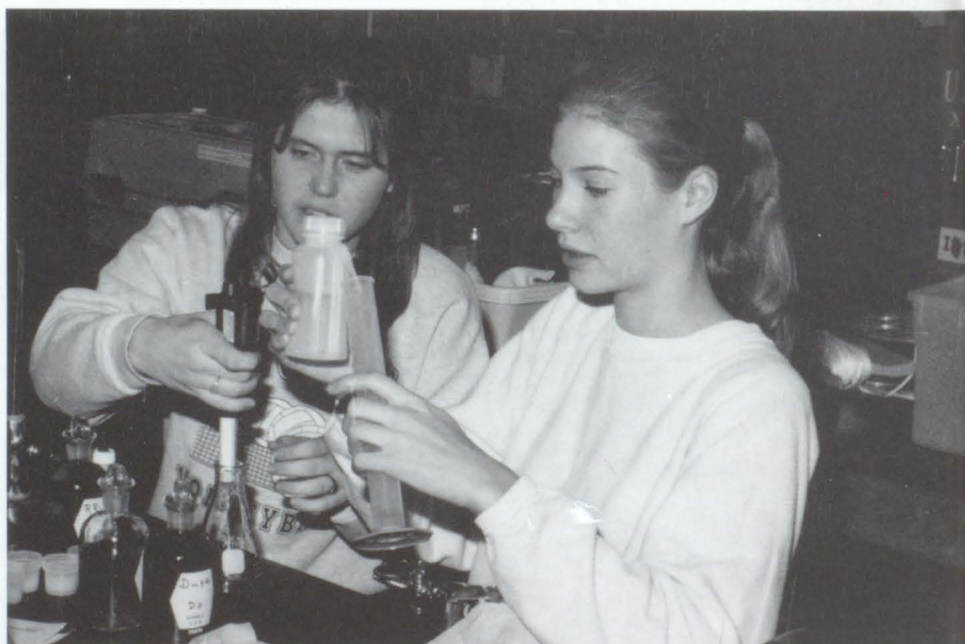
Cover Field

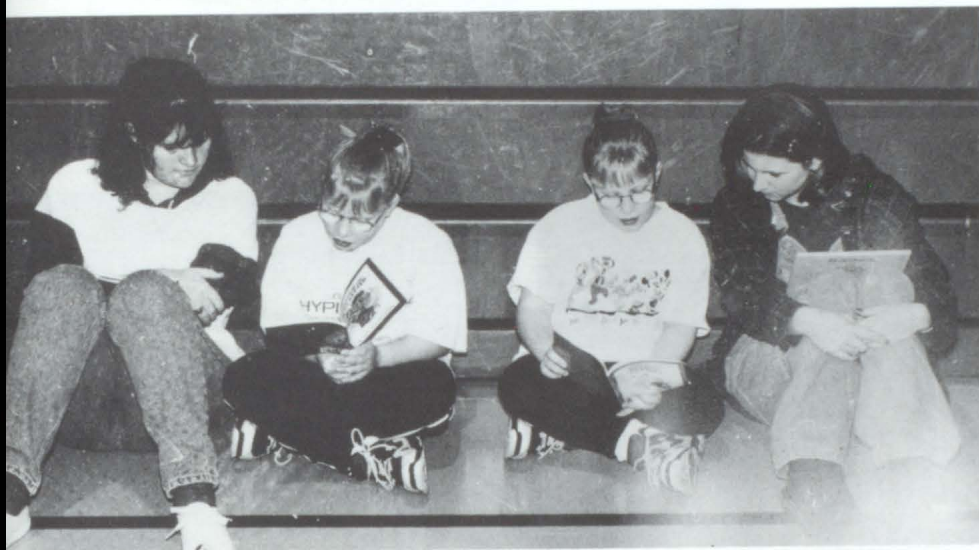
Riverwatch Program

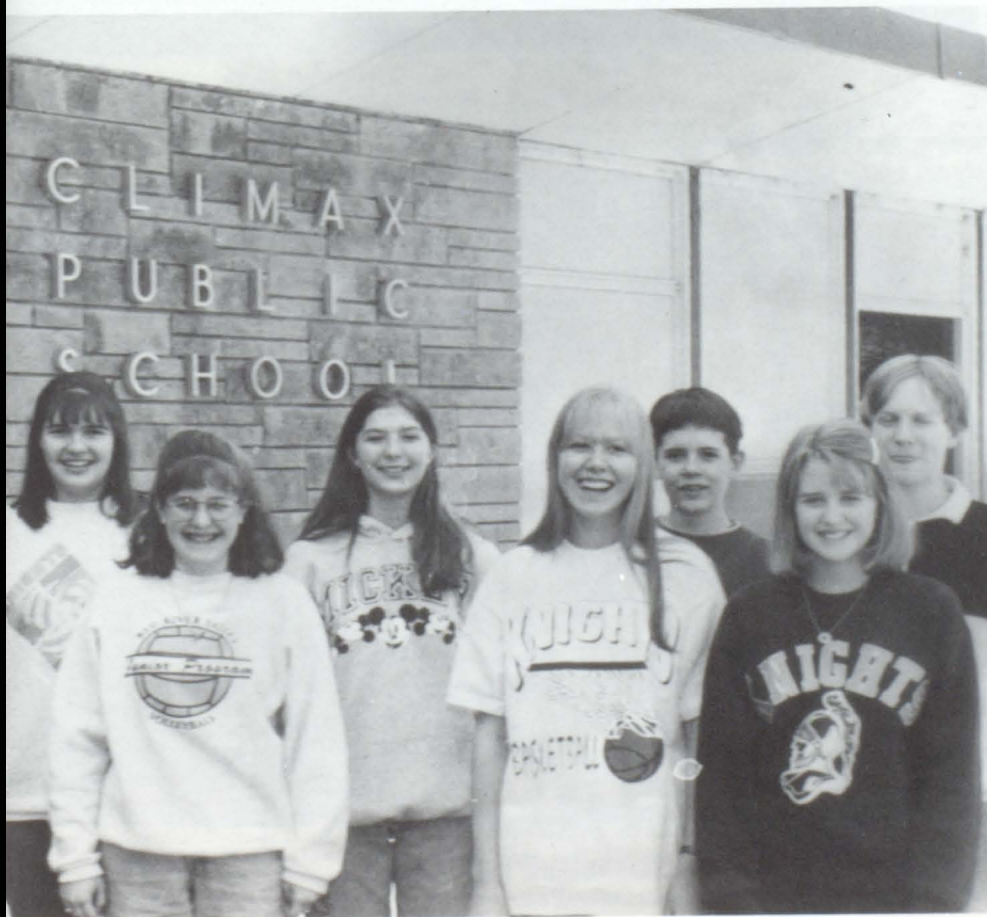
Spelling Bee

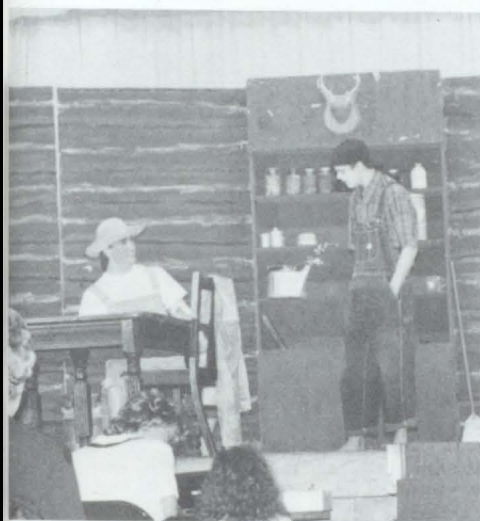

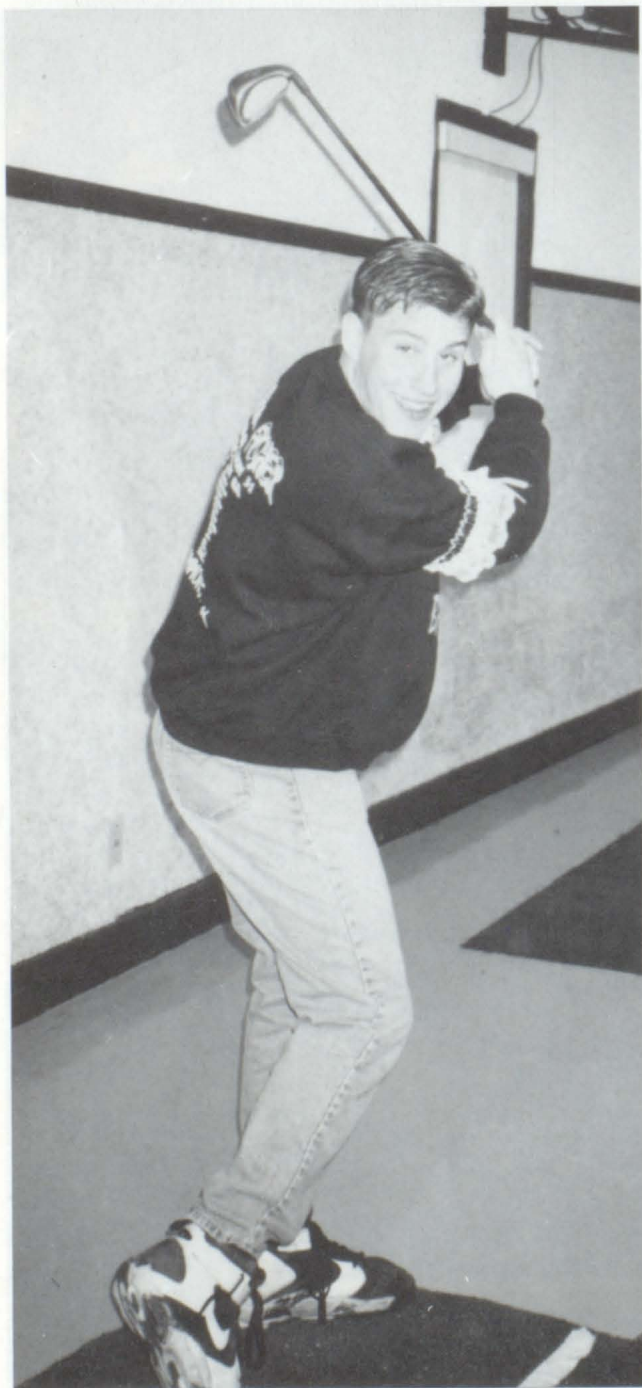
