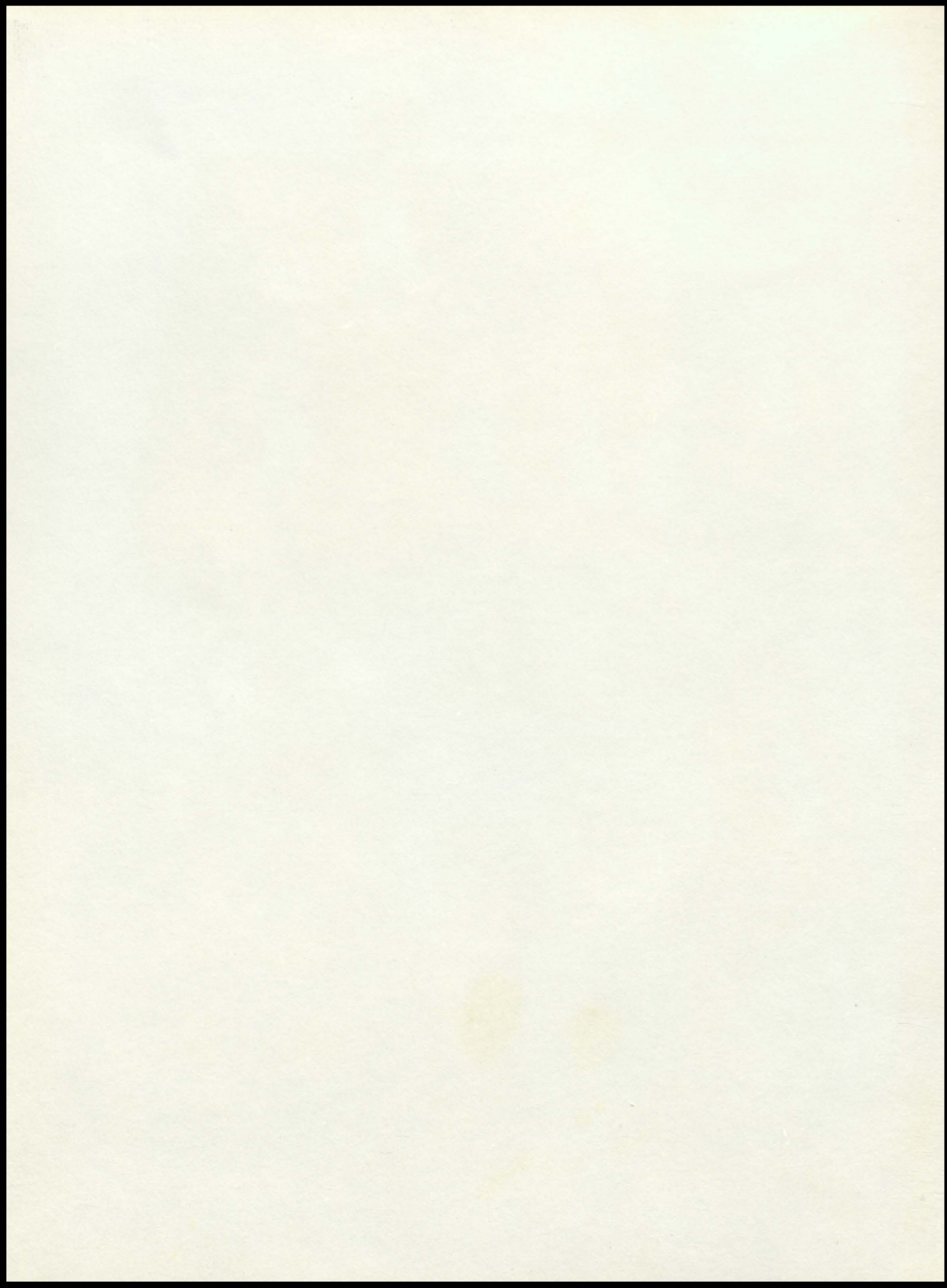
Once they had discovered what other lands were like, some of the Vikings began to think of leaving their own homes forever, and settling somewhere better.

The Vikings sailed westward from their homelands far across the sea. First they found the island of Iceland. Many Vikings made their homes there. One of them was called Eric the Red - because of his red hair. He sailed farther west from Iceland and discovered Greenland. Greenland is very cold with little good land for farming. Eric the Red's son, Leif Eriksson, decided to sail even farther west in search of better land. He and his men braved the cold seas nobody had dared to sail before. At last he reached the coast of North America.

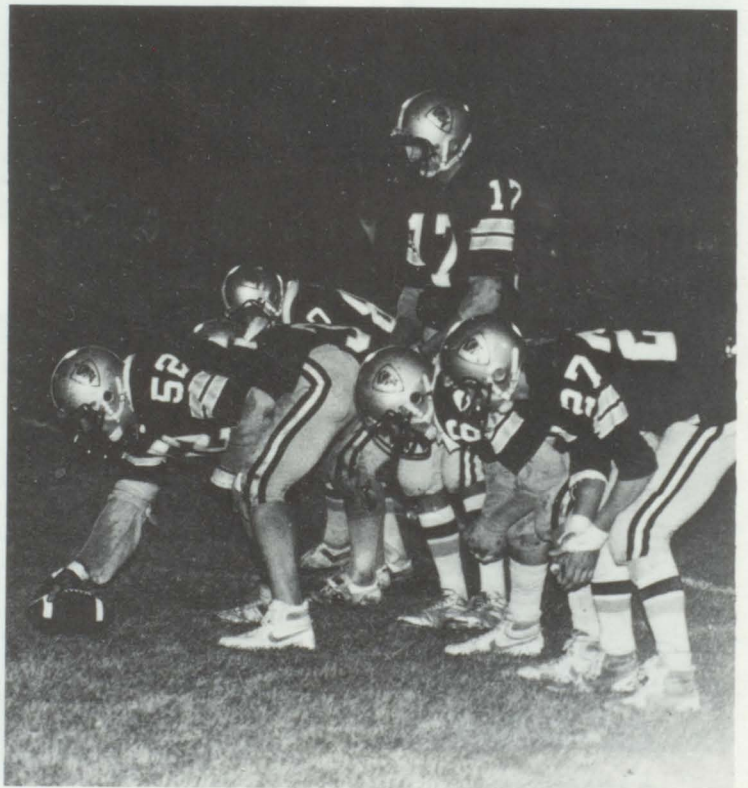

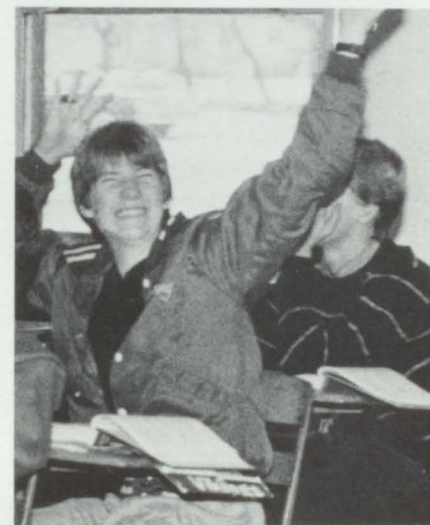
The money from the sales was used towards the Junior-Senior prom which was held on the Dakota Queen, the new paddle boat in Grand Forks.

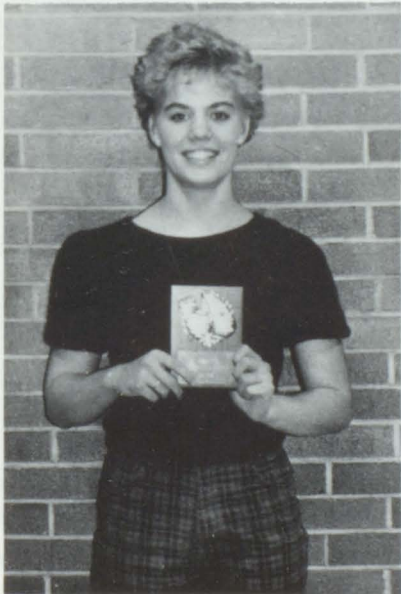

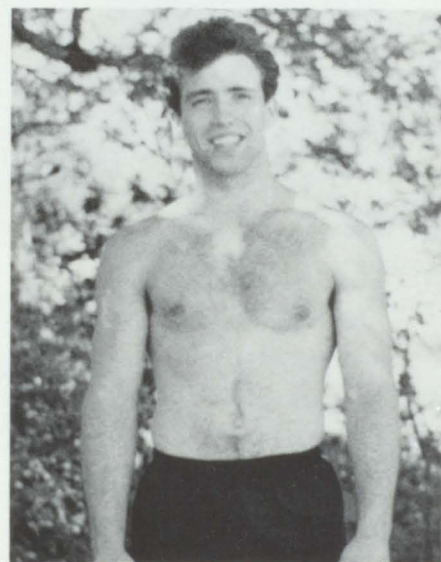

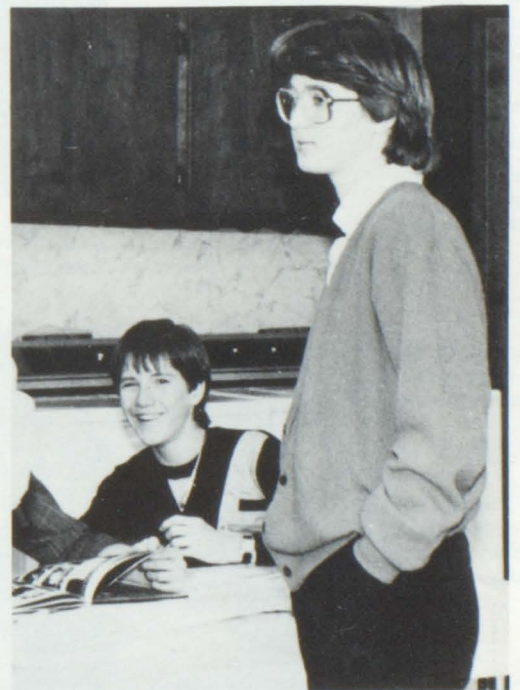

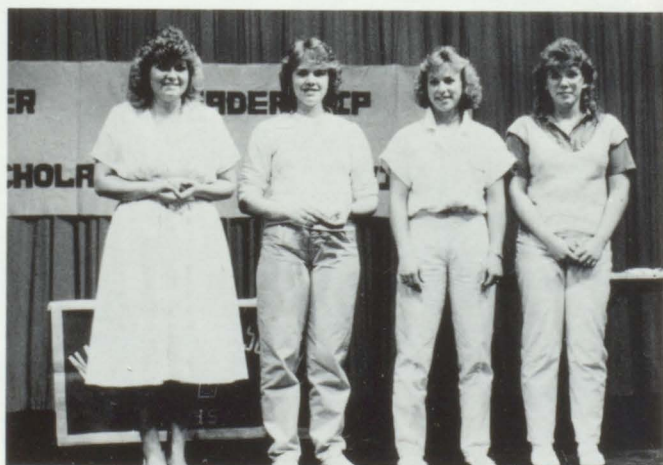
